| <p>3:00pm – 4:15pm South American B</p> | <p>Addressing Social Risk Factors in Quality Measurement</p> <p><u>Speakers</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Mary Barton, Vice President, Performance Measurement, National Committee for Quality Assurance</i> • <i>Helen Burstin, Chief Scientific Officer, National Quality Forum</i> <p><u>Moderator</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Deborah Paone, DrPH, MHA, Consultant, Performance Evaluation & Policy, SNP Alliance</i> <p>Dr. Helen Burstin, Chief Scientific Officer from the National Quality Forum will discuss implications of the National Academies and Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation recent studies/reports on accounting for social risk factors in quality measurement under Medicare. Dr. Burstin is invited to specifically share insights about what these findings mean for enhancing, improving, or modifying quality measures and measurement approaches for Dual populations. These approaches must be meaningful for the spectrum of individuals with varying conditions and social risk issues, such as younger people 18-64 with disabilities and high behavioral health needs, frail older persons age 85+ with high functional/cognitive needs, and other defined subgroups within the Duals.</p> <p>Dr. Mary Barton, Vice President from the National Committee for Quality Assurance will discuss the NCQA’s next steps and proposed options being explored to account for social risk factors in quality measurement for health plans and providers serving high Dual populations. Strategies and options for addressing quality improvement and reporting in ways that are meaningful and relevant for these population groups will be explored. Recent decisions around stratification of HEDIS data will also be shared.</p> <p>Both Drs. Burstin and Barton will participate in a facilitated discussion with SNP Alliance member experts in quality and performance measurement to discuss different approaches toward improving accuracy, meaning, and utility of quality measurement for individuals with complex and interacting medical, behavioral, and social risk issues such as in the Dual population(s).</p> |
